### Integrated Care: Serving Dual-Eligible Beneficiaries

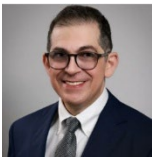
Fragmentation and misalignment across health care delivery systems create significant challenges in navigating services for individuals dually eligible for Medicare and Medicaid, particularly given the breadth of needs they bring. Supporting consumer choice for dual eligibles requires employing person-centered planning to assist older adults and people with disabilities with varied needs in navigating a complex health care landscape where delivery systems are not designed to work together.

This presentation will offer a survey of the leading models of care coordination among those dually eligible for Medicare and Medicaid, while also analyzing how these interact with considerations such as geography and the services that consumers require. It will also begin the conversation on how to support these beneficiaries in identifying the options that work best for them – a crucial part of which is helping them to distinguish between “must-haves” and “nice-to-haves.”
